Our Accommodation

For guests visiting Brympton we offer the unique opportunity to stay overnight in this magnificent country house. We make no attempt to offer “Hotel Standard” accommodation, but the chance to flavour and experience staying overnight in this beautiful and little known Grade 1 listed stately home which is now owned by a charitable trust. You must be prepared to find some of the rooms in the house still lit with candle light, floorboards which creak, and large fireplaces which can sometimes be draughty, but our guest rooms have comfortable beds, ensuite bathrooms and central heating!

Our Guest Bedrooms

Our guest bedrooms are located in the main house on the 2nd floor in the Rose and Cricket wings and in Medieval Home Farm which is attached to the rear of the main building. The Rose Wing is named after Gertrude Jekyll who influenced the old rose garden at Brympton and has been the inspiration for the new rose planting on the south terrace. The Cricket Wing celebrates the houses association with one of the oldest cricket club in the country—the I Zingaris or Wandering Players. The D’Evercy Tower rooms are located in Medieval Home Farm and are accessed by a twisting stone turret. The Fane rooms are located on the ground floor of Home Farm and commemorate Lady Georgiana Fane who inherited Brympton from her father the Earl of Westmoreland in the 1800’s. There is a lovely guest sitting room located in the Rose Wing on the second floor where ‘in house’ guests can enjoy a cup of tea or coffee, relax with the newspapers or watch a DVD. Children’s toys and board games are also available here.

Our Plumbing

Our antiqued plumbing system struggles to supply hot water to every room during the peak periods, especially as our lovely old roll top baths are so enticingly deep! However our boiler has a quick recovery time so please be patient. Our plumbing also struggles to cope with **anything other than paper** in the lavatories—so please dispose of sanitary products/wet wipes/nappies in the bins provided.

Housekeeping

We have supplies of pillows, towels, electric under blankets and headache tablets for any guest who requests them. The easiest way to do this is to hang a luggage label with details of your request on your bedroom door. We also offer microwave facilities for warming babies bottles and a fridge for storage. Other ‘in house’ facilities include a hard tennis court and croquet lawn—we have spare bats and balls for anyone who wants to play!

Breakfast is provided by the staff of Brympton House Weddings and is served in the Star Chamber from 9 am until 10 am.

The Medieval Star Chamber is at the back of the house and can be accessed either by walking straight through the house from the entrance door and turning left at the end of the passage or by going through the wooden gate set to the left of the entrance, continuing on through the enclosed walkway, out into the courtyard garden and then entering the Star Chamber through the back door!

Check Out time for all guests is 10am.

Smoking is not permitted anywhere inside the building.

The History of Brympton House

Brympton House is set within 33 acres of glorious parkland and lakes and has a history that can be traced back to the Domesday Book.

The House was once at the centre of the medieval village of Brympton D’Evercy, but today no traces of this remain.

The Main House was built between 1460 and 1680 and is approached by a long private drive.

Nestling close to the main building is the 1350 Dower House, Bell Tower, Orangery & St Andrews Church; a grouping that led Christopher Hussey—the architectural writer for Country Life to describe Brympton as the ‘most beautiful house in England’.

Since the land was acquired by the D’Evercy family soon after the Norman Conquest Brympton has been lived in by only 3 families: the D’Evercy’s, the Sydenham’s and the Fane’s.

The Clive-Ponsonby-Fane family still live on the estate in a house known as Little Brympton. The oldest building on the site is the Dower House which was built in 1350 (some half a century before St Andrew’s Church) and was the original medieval manor of Brympton. The Star Chamber also dates from this time and would have housed the medieval kitchens. In 1420 the Elizabethan West Front of Brympton was built by John Sydenham and the Dower House was abandoned. The next major building phase occurred in 1680 when the back of the Elizabethan hall was demolished and replaced with the Restoration South Front.

When the Earl of Westmoreland’s daughter Lady Georgiana Fane inherited Brympton in 1826 the Victorian Lodge was built.
